## 3M™ DRG Assurance™

Clinical Documentation Improvement (CDI) describes the process of reducing the disconnect between what clinicians write in the medical record and what clinical coders need for producing quality casemix data. It achieves this by placing a CDI specialist or Clinical Documentation Specialist (CDS) on the ward to review clinical documentation in a timely manner while the patient is still admitted. CDI specialists help clinicians document in a format which is clear, complete and accurate so it aids with patient management and is readily acceptable for clinical coding [Buttner et al., 2014] [Lo, 2014].

3M has been helping hospitals engage in CDI with our DRG Assurance™ Program which incorporates CDI baseline measurement record reviews (Phase 1), comprehensive training for CDS (Phase 2), site-based coaching and clinician education sessions on CDI.

For hospitals who have appointed dedicated staff to perform concurrent CDI activities the DRG Assurance™ Phase 2 training equips participants with extensive knowledge, resources and hands-on training so their effectiveness is accelerated in their role. The content of this training is fully aligned with ICD-10-AM Australian Coding Standards and AR-DRG grouper-specific content. Training is currently available in ICD-10-AM/ACHI Ninth Edition (AR-DRG v5.1, v6.0x, v7.0, v8.0) and Tenth Edition (AR-DRG v5.1, v6.0x, v8.0, v9.0).

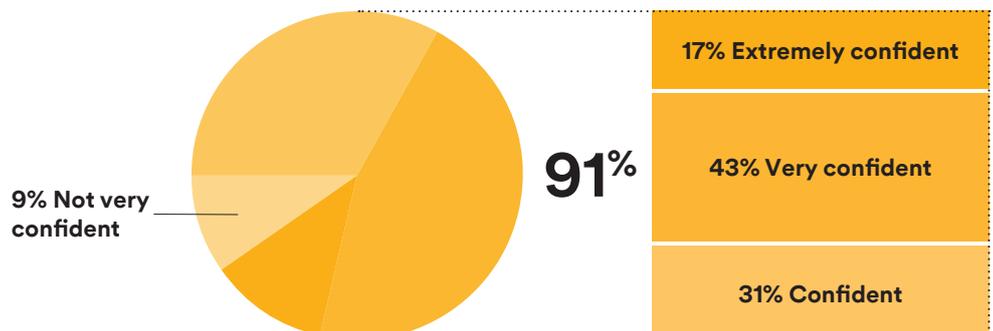
## Areas of competency for the Clinical Documentation Specialist

1. Participants know how to review documentation for improvement and learn how to query/engage clinicians
2. Participants understand the relationship between documentation, coding and the DRG outcome
3. Participants understand the documentation principles which allows for the classification of a diagnosis or procedure
4. Participants understand the relationship between the principal diagnosis (PDx), additional diagnoses (ADx), procedures and major diagnostic categories (MDC), diagnosis related groups (DRG) and complexity
5. Participants are able to assign a working DRG

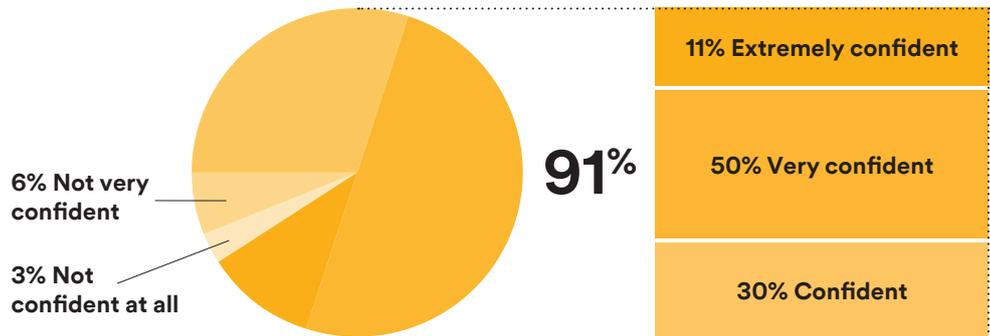
## Results

The below graphs summarise the feedback from our Australian participants collected on the completion of their DRG Assurance™ Phase 2 training. The survey was kept anonymous to encourage honest feedback.

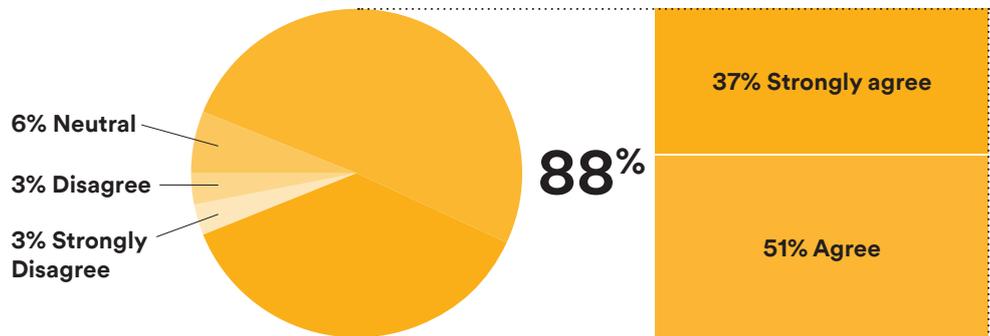
**91% of participants indicated they were confident to extremely confident in approaching doctors with CDI related queries.**



**91% of participants indicated they were confident to extremely confident in assigning working DRGs to inpatient records.**
